Forensic Imaging in NSW *Unlocking the Power of 3D Crime Scene Data*

Domenic Raneri has been an officer with the New South Wales Police Force since 2013. He leads the Crime Scene Reconstruction team of the Forensic Imaging Section, where he has introduced and developed their capabilities for forensic 3D imaging. Through the use of sophisticated laser scanners and advanced photographic techniques, forensic investigators are now able to produce powerful 3D crime scene reconstructions, permitting innovative interrogation of evidence within the context of



the original scene. Numerous useful analyses are able to be conducted within the 3D space, revealing details and useful evidence not previously attainable through conventional methods.



Domenic has delivered expert testimony in the Supreme and Coronial courts of NSW, whilst having attended and completed crime scene reconstructions for over 50 major crimes and incidents, including homicides, terrorism events and serious motor vehicle collisions. Some notable cases include the Rozelle Fire, Lindt Cafe Siege and Lin Family Murders. By unlocking the interactive power of 3D data, the Forensic Services Group are meeting the rising expectations of our courts to deliver the most powerful, precise and compelling evidence possible.

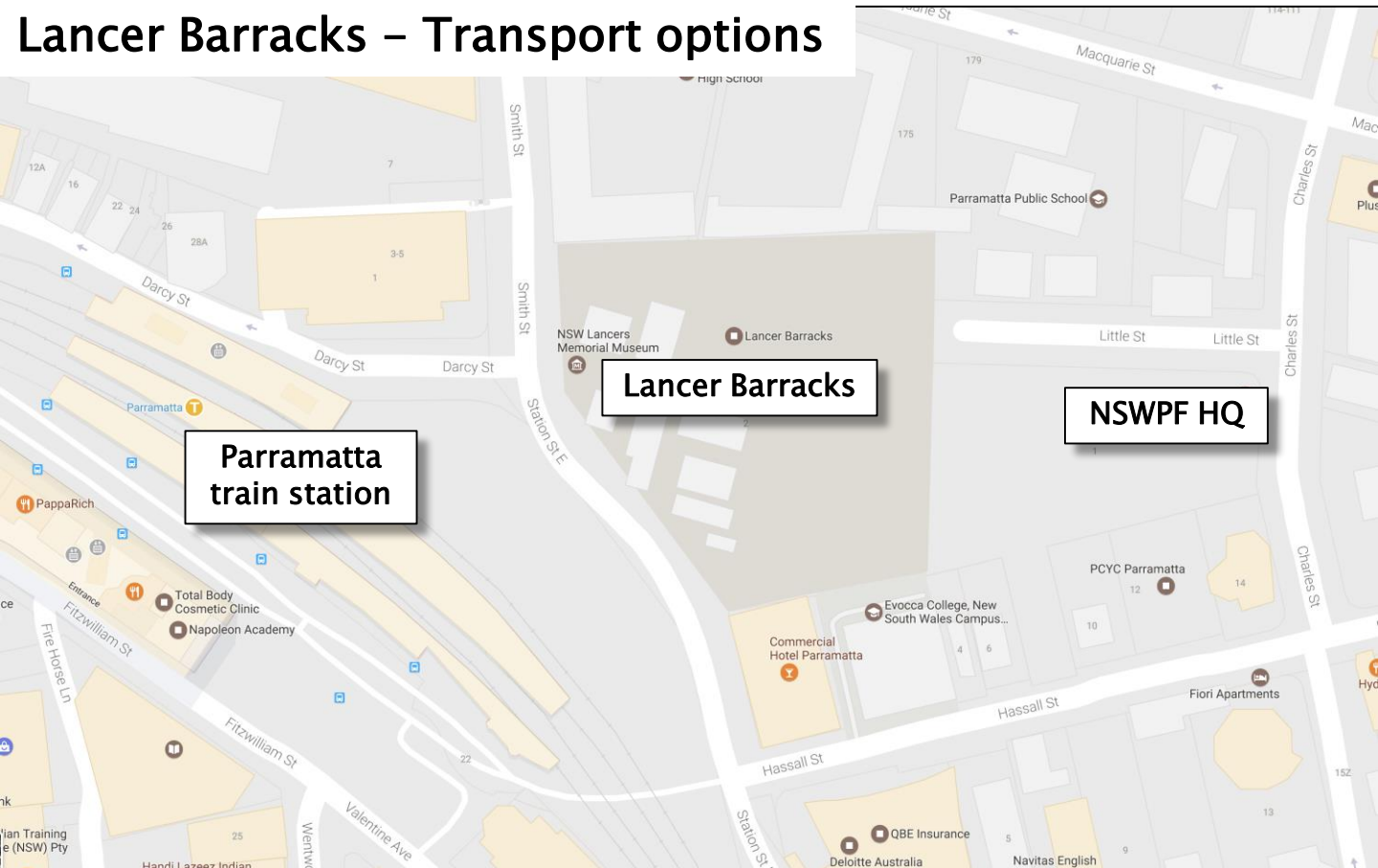


Detective Chief Inspector John Snowden

John Snowden joined the NSW Police Force in 1947, and spent over 31 years of his 37 year Police career in the Scientific Investigation Branch; commencing as the most junior staff member and eventually becoming the Detective Chief Inspector in Charge then until his retirement in 1984. During his career, John introduced many technical innovations in the field of photography. He helped solve some of Australia's most notorious crimes of murder, including one of Australia's most publicised cases; the 1960 kidnapping of Graeme Thorne (the son of Basil Thorne who had won the Sydney Opera House Lottery). He was involved in that investigation from the initial examination of the body where found to the final conviction of Stephen Leslie Bradley when sentenced to life imprisonment. Mr Snowden's team worked tirelessly to police the community, capture useful forensic images, complete scientific investigations and reduce crime. John was instrumental in the early days of the ANZFSS NSW branch. This meeting will be held in his honour.

Public transport:
